Homelessness Funding & the King County Regional Homelessness Authority

DCHS contracts approximately \$50M funds to KCRHA for:

- Shelter
- Transitional housing
- Rapid rehousing

Funding includes:

- <u>Federal</u>: ESG (Emergency Solutions Grant) and CDBG (Community Development Block Grant)
- <u>State</u>: Consolidated Homelessness Grant (CHG)
- <u>Local</u> (limited): Document Recording Fees and Veterans, Seniors, and Human Services Levy
