EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANTS PROGRAM

Overview

The Homeless Emergency Assistance and Rapid Transition to Housing (HEARTH) Act of 2009 amended to the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, revised the Emergency Shelter Grants Program and renamed it to the Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) program. The ESG Interim Rule took effect on January 4, 2012. The change in the program name reflects the change in focus from addressing the needs of homeless people in emergency or transitional shelters to assisting people to quickly regain stability in permanent housing after experiencing a housing crisis and/or homelessness.

The program provides funding to:

- Engage homeless individuals and families living on the street;
- Improve the number and quality of emergency shelters for homeless individuals and families;
- Help operate these shelters;
- Provide essential services to shelter residents;
- Rapidly re-house homeless individuals and families; and
- Prevent families and individuals from becoming homeless.

ESG funds may be used for these five program components: street outreach, emergency shelter, homelessness prevention, rapid re-housing assistance, Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), as well as up to 7.5% of a recipient's allocation can be used for administrative activities.

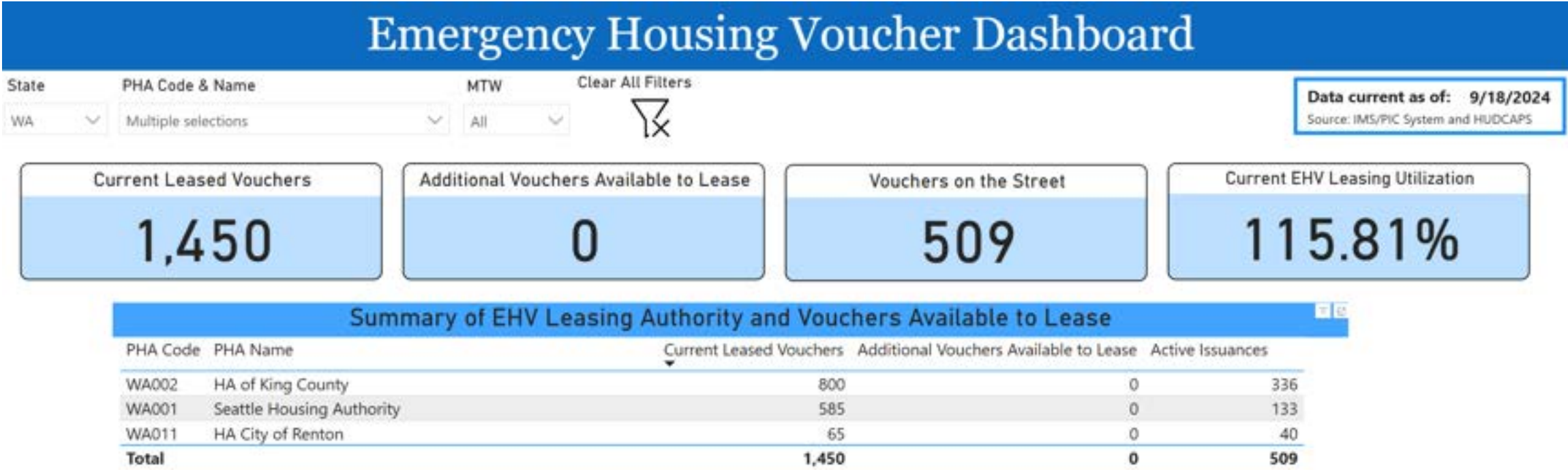


EMERGENCY HOUSING VOUCHERS

Overview

The Emergency Housing Voucher (EHV) program provides a significant opportunity for Public Housing Authorities (PHAs), Continuums of Care (CoCs), and Victim Service Providers (VSPs) to develop collaborative partnerships and strategies that effectively address the needs of vulnerable populations in their communities. Through EHV, HUD provided 70,000 housing choice vouchers to local PHAs in order to assist individuals and families who are homeless, at-risk of homelessness, fleeing, or attempting to flee, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or human trafficking, or were recently homeless or have a high risk of housing instability.

EHV COMMUNITY SUCCESS STORY

KING COUNTY, WASHINGTON

PARTNERSHIP SUCCESS STORY

OVERVIEW

The King County region, which includes Seattle as one of its 39 cities, is working hard to meet the needs of a large unsheltered homeless population and is finding success through federally funded Emergency Housing Vouchers (EHVs). In 2021, King County Housing Authority (KCHA) was awarded 762 EHVs and nearly \$18.4 million in funding through the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, to be implemented in partnership with the new King County Regional Homelessness Authority (KCRHA). Through thoughtful planning and collaboration with community partners, KCHA has leased 100% of these vouchers serving households experiencing or at risk of homelessness, survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, and human trafficking. KCHA and its partners attribute their success to a combination of intentional elements.

KEY PARTNERSHIP STRATEGIES

- **Inclusive & regional planning process** – KCHA partnered with King County Regional Homelessness Authority (KCRHA, the lead Continuum of Care entity), Seattle Housing Authority, and Renton Housing Authority to quickly implement a regional approach with the goal of distributing EHVs equitably and in a timely manner. The partnership set up weekly operational and leadership meetings to mobilize efforts and solicited input from

expansion, KCRHA was able to increase equitable access to the EHV program by bringing on new providers working outside of existing systems who primarily served Black, Indigenous and People of color as well as underserved communities across the County.

- **Use of data to inform decision-making** – KCHA developed predictive dashboards to project the volume of referrals, voucher issuances and housing

EHV REGIONAL SUCCESS

The regional approach implemented among the three PHAs in the King County area has resulted in successful lease-ups across the area.

MAINSTREAM VOUCHERS

Mainstream vouchers assist non-elderly persons with disabilities. Aside from serving a special population, Mainstream vouchers are administered using the same rules as other housing choice vouchers. Funding and financial reporting for Mainstream vouchers is separate from the regular tenant-based voucher program. Please see PIH Notice 2020-01 for more information.

The 2017, 2018, and 2019 Appropriations Acts provided funding for new Mainstream vouchers. Since 2018, HUD has awarded over \$500 million in funding to public housing agencies (PHAs) to support 50,000 new Mainstream vouchers.

NON-ELDERLY DISABLED (NED) VOUCHERS

Overview

Since 1997, Housing Choice Vouchers (HCVs) have been awarded under different special purpose voucher program types to serve non-elderly persons with disabilities (NED):

- **FY 2009 NED Category 1 and Category 2:** The Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA) for Rental Assistance for Non-Elderly Persons with Disabilities (NED) was published in the Federal Register on April 1, 2010 ([NOFA](#)). This NOFA was the outcome of collaborative efforts between HUD and the Department of Health and Human Services' (HHS) Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS).
 - **Category 1** vouchers enable non-elderly persons or families with disabilities to access affordable housing on the private market. Awards for Category 1 vouchers were announced on October 1, 2010. 4,321 vouchers were awarded to 46 PHAs in 19 states, Washington, DC, and Puerto Rico.  - **Category 2** vouchers enable non-elderly persons with disabilities currently residing in nursing homes or other healthcare institutions to transition into the community. Awards for Category 2 vouchers were announced on January 6, 2011 and became effective February 1, 2011. 948 vouchers were awarded to 28 PHAs in 15 states. Foster Youth to Independence Initiative

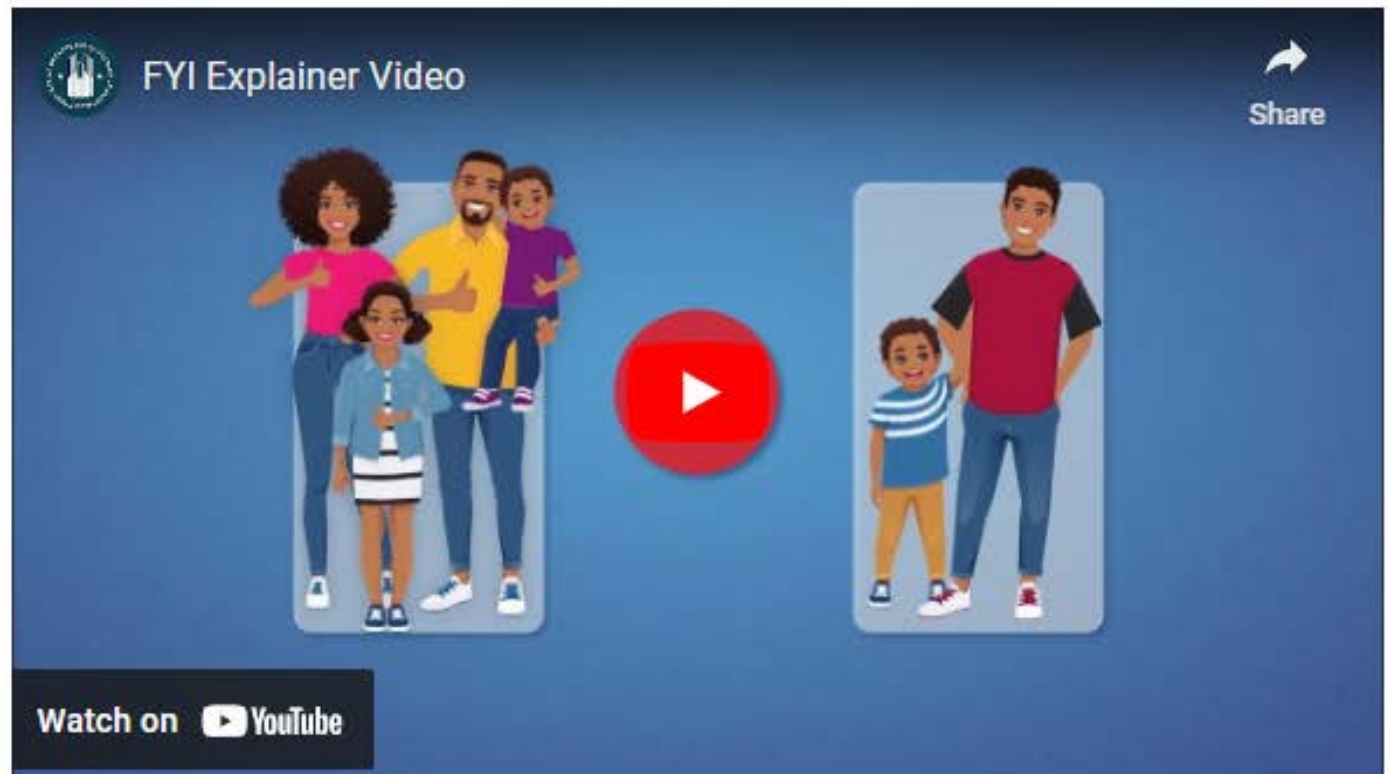
The Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) initiative makes Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) assistance available to Public Housing Agencies (PHAs) in partnership with Public Child Welfare Agencies (PCWAs). Under FYI, PHAs provide housing assistance on behalf of: Youth at least 18 years and not more than 24 years of age who left foster care, or will leave foster care within 90 days, in accordance with a transition plan described in Section 475(5)(H) of the Social Security Act, and are homeless or are at risk of becoming homeless at age 16 or older.

FYI Explainer Video

This 2D explainer video is designed to assist Public Housing Authority (PHA) staff in administering the Foster Youth to Independence (FYI) voucher program. The goal of the video is to enhance PHA staff's familiarity with the technical requirements of the program so as to better engage FYI-eligible youth and to ensure lease-up as well as longevity on, and/or completion of, the 36-month voucher. This video may be leveraged as a training tool in PHA staff meetings to raise awareness of FYI program requirements. Topics covered in the video include:

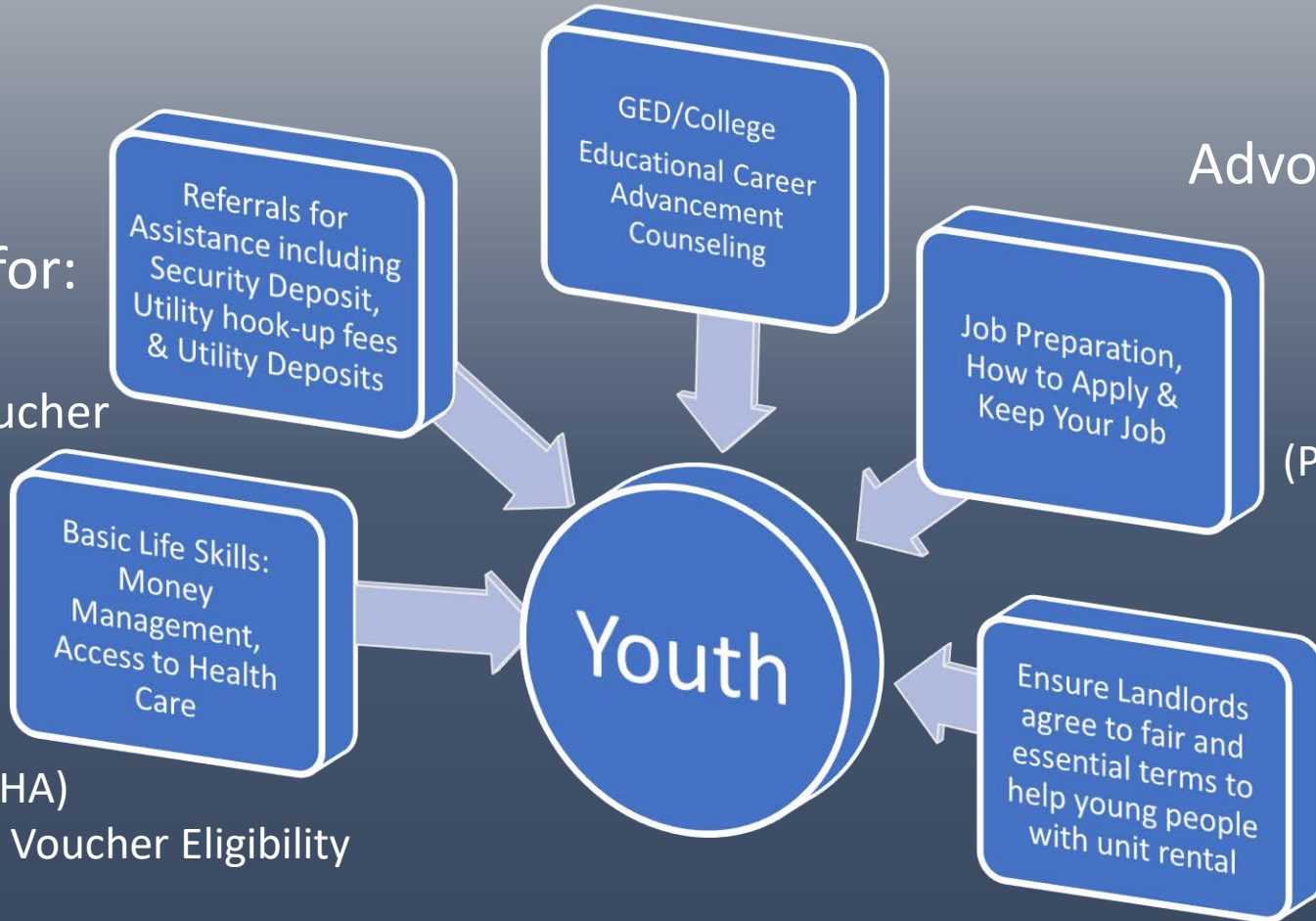

YOUTH HOMELESSNESS SYSTEM IMPROVEMENT (YHSI) GRANTS

Overview

HUD announced [\\$51 million in funding for the Youth Homelessness System Improvement \(YHSI\) grants](#) on June 6, 2024. YHSI grants will support selected communities in either improving an existing response system for youth homelessness or establishing and implementing a new youth homelessness response system. The grants will focus on systemic change by funding projects that create and build capacity for Youth Action Boards; collect and use data on at-risk youth and youth experiencing homelessness; develop strong leaders within a community; and improve the coordination, communication, operation, and administration of homeless assistance projects to better serve youth, including prevention and diversion strategies. these grants are designed to make and improve connections, coordination, and information sharing within and between systems that serve at-risk youth, including education, child welfare, and juvenile justice.

YHSI grants are being awarded to [38 communities](#) across the United States including 26 states, Puerto Rico, and Guam. The YHSI grants will help these communities build a strong, resilient, and equitable homelessness response system that is less siloed and will break down barriers for youth in crisis. Recognizing that systemic change is often larger than one Continuum of Care, HUD incentivized statewide or cross-community project proposals to emphasize the need for coordination across communities.

HUD 811 Rental Assistance

The HUD 811 Project Rental Assistance grant was awarded to Commerce by the Office of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This grant will provide project-based rental assistance to develop supportive housing for extremely low-income, non-elderly disabled households. The program's mission is consistent with the guiding principles of the Americans with Disabilities Act and with the 1999 U.S. Supreme Court ruling in *Olmstead v. L.C.*, which requires state and local governments to provide services to individuals with disabilities in the most integrated setting appropriate to their needs. The Department of Social and Health Services is partnering with Commerce to provide and coordinate services.

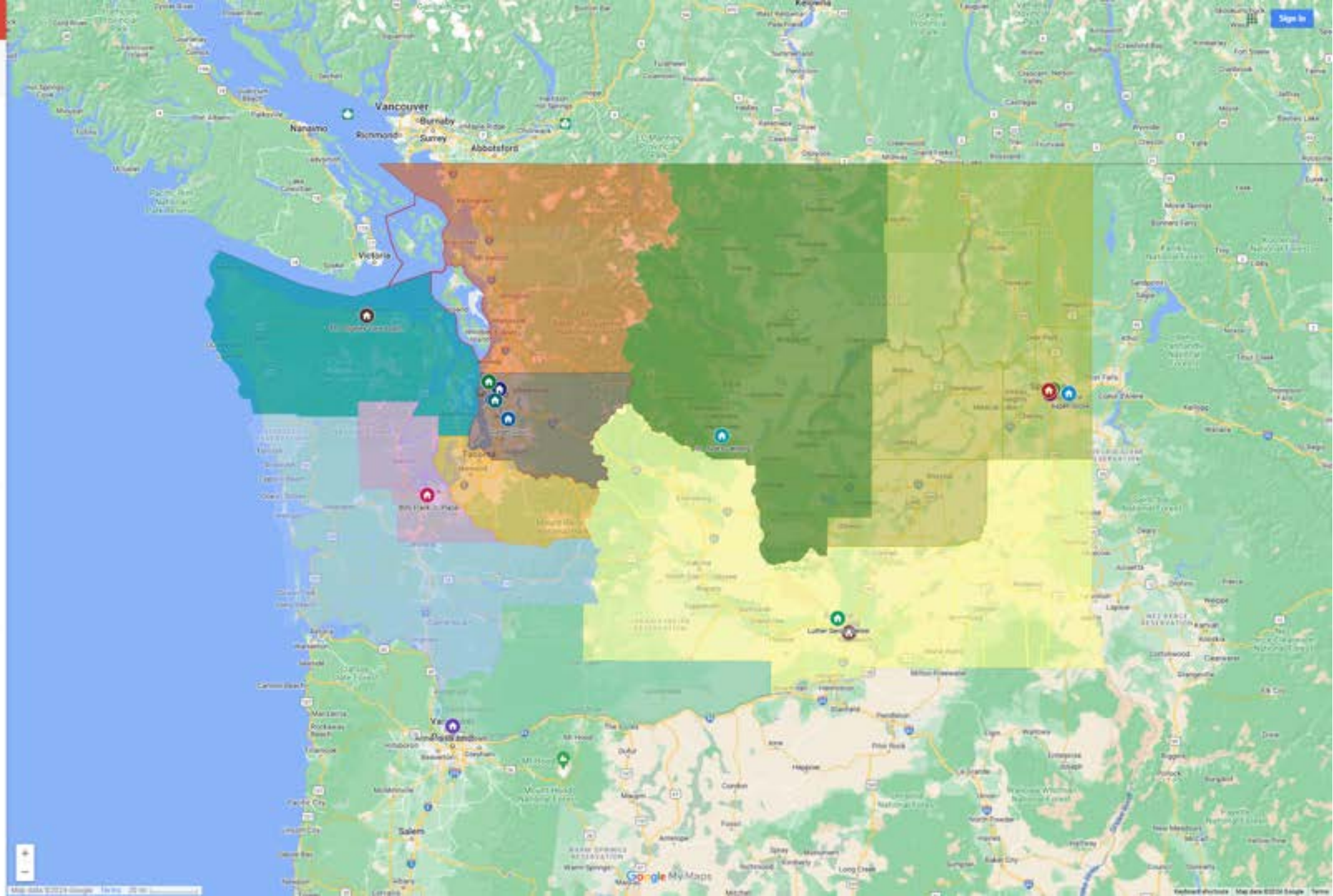

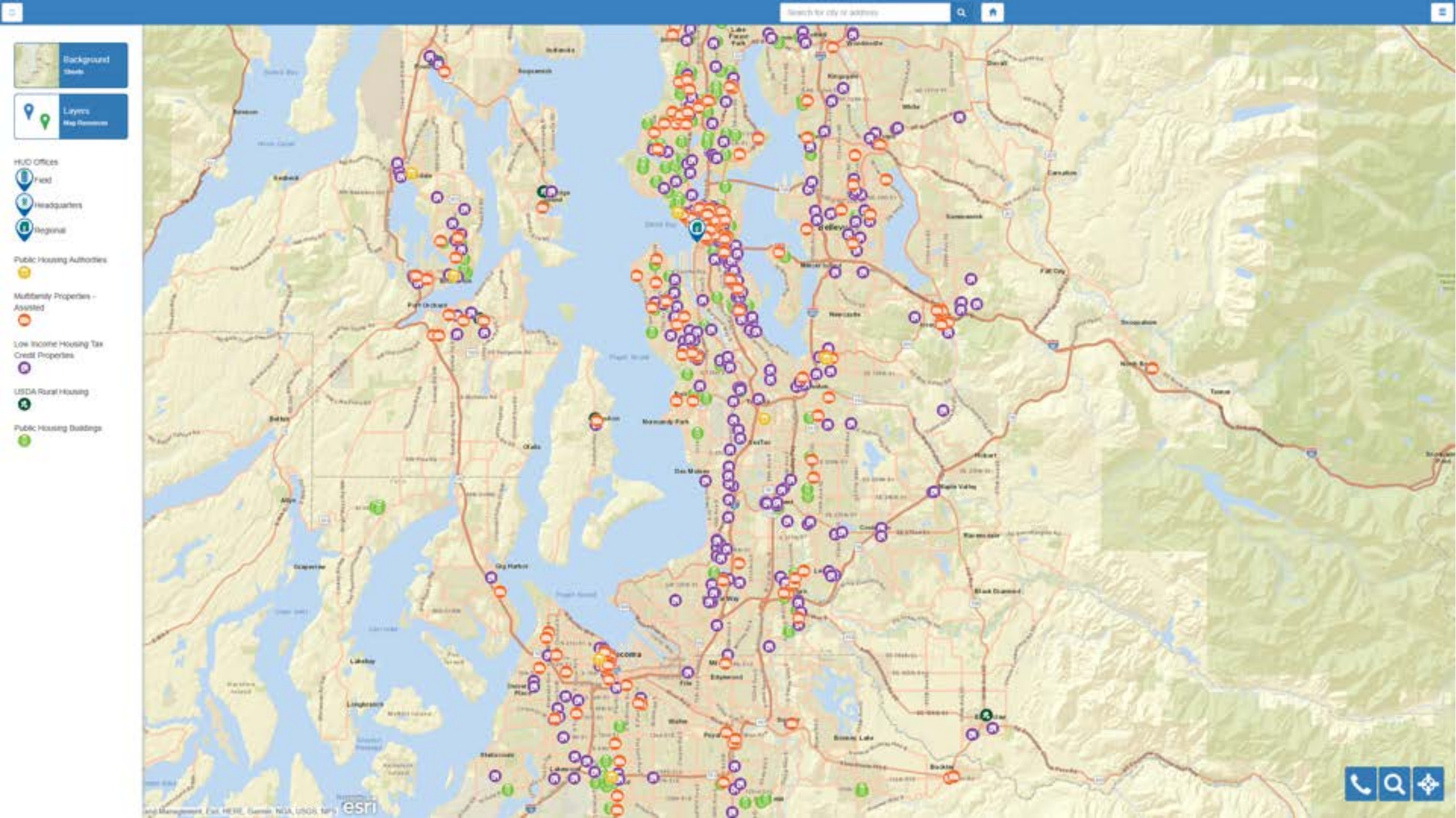

Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) – The Notice of Funding Opportunities (NOFO) is published each year on Grants.gov for HUD's Discretionary Funding Programs. These NOFOs describe the type of funding available on a competitive basis and provides information on submission of an application, typically up to 30 to 90 days from the date of the NOFO publication on grants.gov.
